chance. When you have time, don't forget to go to a park to go for a walk or play on the sand beach. You will have a great time.




Sophia Books



MILD FACE SCRUB:














A Real Canadian Hero_Terry Fox

ave you seen the Monument at the end of Robson Street in Vancouver? A man's picture was carved on the wall of the arched door. He is Terry Fox--a real Canadian hero.

He was born in Winnipeg in 1959, but he grew up in Vancouver. Terry was only 18 years old when he was diagnosed with bone cancer. He was forced to have his right leg cut off above the knee. He wanted to help find a cure for cancer, so when he realized that cancer research was severely underfunded in Canada, he decided to run across the country to raise money for cancer research. He called his journey the "Marathon of Hope". With a firm belief, Terry started his marathon on April 12, 1980 in Newfoundland. Although it was difficult to use his artificial leg in the beginning, he quickly became used to it. The money that

was collected along his route began to increase quickly. Terry ran 43 kilometers every day. It was a journey that Canadians never forgot.

However, on September 1st, after running for 143 days and 5,373 kilometers. Terry was forced to stop running in Ontario because the cancer had reappeared in his lungs. Terry passed away on June 28, 1981 at age 22. The whole nation was saddened.

The heroic Canadian was gone, but his legacy was just beginning.
Terry's original plan was to raise more than \$ 24 million for cancer research. To date, the run was raised more than \$ 200 million. Terry Fox is a symbol of the Canadian spirit and an example of the best qualities of a human beings. His dream was considered a dream as big as his country.

nterview with Christiaan Bernard, Marketing Manager of Kester Grant College.

Q: Many people call you Christian. We know, this is not your real name. What is your name?

A: Ha-ha. My name is Christiaan, C-H-R-I-S-T-I-A-A-N, but people usually call me Christian.

Q: How long have you been working at KGC and what is your job here?

A: I have been working here since last October 15th. I am the marketing manager.

Q: What kind of work do you do in your job? "One part of my job is to find places where students can go on Friday afternoons for activities. Also I talk with people who are interested in studying here. In Vancouver, many companies send students to language schools, so I talk to them about KGC. I also make advertisements for Kester Grant College and do promotions to other countries. Often, I need to send letters or phone agencies to explain what our school is like. I put special Ads together. Then I get them proof read by Divna. After that, I must send them to BCIT, if BCIT says "No." I must change them. Now I am doing an advertisement for Mexico. It will be translated into Spanish, and go to ten thousand magazines for students and families. Our school's ads will go to 18 different areas, like: China, Korea, Vietnam, Brunei, Thailand and Australia, etc. Because many students are from China, I try to bring other countries' students to our school to study. There are two students who are coming from Persia and Switzerland who will study in our school."

Q: As we know, students like to call you "the Good Morning Sir" guy because you greet everyone who comes into the school every morning. Is that a part of your job?

A: No, it isn't. I just try to give everyone a very good "good morning" to start their day. This is just my style; I also did it in my last job.

Q: You are usually still here after students leave. How long do you work each day?

A: I usually arrive at school between

7:30am-8:00am and leave school between 4:30pm-6:00pm. I am trying to leave school before 4:30pm, but it is sometimes hard because of my busy work schedule.

Q: When you are not busy working, how do you spend your time?

A: I like to go cycling, hiking, camping, kayaking and rock climbing. Also, I like to walk around Chinatown because I live close to Chinatown. Sometimes I enjoy drinking *Micro Brewery* beer with friends.

Q: Are you from Vancouver and why did you decide to work at KGC?

A: No, I am not from Vancouver. When I was young, my mother was a nurse in the army. We had to move from place to place, so I lived everywhere except Québec. If you have any questions about traveling in Canada, just come to ask me. I used to work for a university students' service department, like Harb, but then I decided to get into marketing. So I came here.

Q: What would you like to be doing five years from now?

A: I want to retire and have fun. My plans are to do a part time job, which I really enjoy and spend a lot of time doing things I'm interested in. Actually, I will probably be working in international education or international marketing in 5 years. I most likely will get married and adopt a child from another country and give his/her a chance to come to Canada.

Interview with Liane L. Gebauer from CVI

any international students live in homestay situations when they begin their study program in other countries. However, Most students don't have enough information about homestays. Have you met the "homestay lady"?

Her name is Liane L. Gebauer. She is the director of placement for CVI (Canada Vancouver International Homestay). She usually comes to KGC every Thursday to talk with students about their homestay situations. It's our pleasure to have had an opportunity to

talk with Liane about students and their homestay families.

Interview between Liane and EPP 6 students (Ava and Fiona).

Could you tell us something about CVI?

CVI Homestay is an independent homestay service offered to schools in the lower mainland. Our focus is to provide a service to the schools by placing international students with homestay families.

O: What are the advantages of living with homestay families?

A: Some advantages are: improving your English, making new friends under a safe and secure environment, truly adapting to North American living and learning how to be " independent".

O: If students don't like the food their homestay families provide, could they ask to have it changed?

A: Actually no. You came here to learn about Canadian culture. Canadian food is included in Canadian culture. You can't require your homestay parents to cook Chinese food for you, and most of them don't know how to cook Chinese food.

Q: If some students want to go back to China for their holidays, how much rent should they pay?

If the student takes a holiday, the host family's remuneration will be adjusted accordingly. There will be an adjustment to the monthly fee if the student spends more than 15 days away from the Homestay family. Adjustments will be deducted the month of the student's absence. The deduction will be calculated per day. While the student is away we realize that Piane L. Gelane

their belongings need to be stored by the homestay family but there will be no supervision of the student required and no food consumption.

Are the students free to have snacks when they want them?

A: Sure, they are. Snacks should be available when desired.

What can students expect from their homestay parents?

A: Some examples are: only English will be spoken when the students are present, being included in families activities, help with adjusting to Canadian life, clear explanations about the house rules in the home, help with checklist, bus routes, library cards, Medicare, etc.

Q: What makes a homestay business successful?

A: A successful homestay business should understand students' behaviors, provide a detailed orientation program for both parties.

Most importantly, it requires the genuine dedication to help students to succeed in reaching their dreams.
