TAKING A TOUR TO VIETNA

hat is the first thing you think of when you hear the word Vietnam? Is it the war? Well, there is so much more to it. Let me take you on a tour to my native country.

Vietnam is an Asian country which borders Cambodia, Laos, Thailand and China. Its capital is Hanoi, located in North Vietnam. There are 64 provinces in Vietnam. The area of this country is about 337.000 km², and the population is approximately 80 million.

Religion:

Vietnam is a multi religious country, as many religions exist here, such as Buddhism, Islam, Christianity, and CaoDai which is a religion unique of Vietnam. However, one of the most popular religions in Vietnam is Buddhism, as 30% of the country's population is Buddhist.

The weather is different in North and South Vietnam. In North Vietnam, there are 4 seasons in a year: spring, summer, autumn and winter. The average temperature in the winter is about 18°C and in summer about 30°C. In South Vietnam, there are only dry and wet seasons. Although we say it's wet, it does not rain as much as in Vancouver. The average temperature here is between 28°C 34°C despite of rain. Therefore, it's especially hot in South Vietnam.

Language:

Vietnamese has six different tones, so the same word can have six pronunciations and also six different meanings. Therefore, it's very difficult for a foreigner to learn and to use Vietnamese. However, there are a lot of other languages which are spoken here, such as French, Chinese, Russian, and English, which is becoming very popular.

Food:

Vietnam is a good place for tourists who want to enjoy seafood. The reason is that it's fresh and the prices are low. The most delicious seafood dish which I want to recommend to you is Tamarind roast crab, which is called Cuarang-me. Moreover, there is also a lot of other tasty food, such as goingo-sen, ca-tai-tuong-chien-xu, and Pho (rice noodle soup), which is

very popular in Vietnam but also in Vancouver. **Interesting places to visit:**

The most interesting place is Hanoi, the capital of Vietnam, where there are a lot of historical sites, such as Ho-hoan-kiem, the cottage of Uncle Ho, who was the first president of Vietnam, and Ha-long Bay, where you can enjoy a very nice view while you are cruising on your ship. In addition, there are a lot of other beautiful sights, such as the old capital Hue, Da-lat Mountain, and Da-nang. Moreover, Vietnam is very famous for its beaches, such as Vung-tau, Nha-trang, Long-hai, Catba. It's a good idea for you to visit these beaches because the weather is usually hot in Vietnam. I hope you visit my country one day and see for yourselves how beautiful it is.





ave you ever tried Korean food? I can introduce you to some Korean food and recommend some Korean restaurants. Have you ever heard of bulgogi? It is a barbecue with a special Korean sauce, so it is known as Korean barbecue. Most people who tried it like it very much. Have you also ever heard of japchea? It is known as Korean noodle without soup. It is a noodle with beef and some other vegetables and it is especially popular among Asians, but many others also like it. Here are two restaurants, Arirang and Jangmojip, where you can try delicious Korean food.

Arirang is located on Cambie, just before you get to Cambie Bridge. The address of the restaurant is 2211 Cambie St. There are many kinds of Korean food that you can enjoy there. The word arirang is from a Korean traditional song and it means a Korean restaurant. There is a buffet where you can try all kinds of Korean style meats, such as bulgogi. However, you can also try a lot of various Korean soups and dishes. I recommend a bibimbab, which is rice mixed with beef and vegetables with Korean spicy sauce, so it is a very spicy dish. If you do not like spicy food, you can try Korean fried rice called bbokumbab. It







is also very nice and I have eaten it there many times. You can also try Korean soup which is similar to miso soup, but at the same time different. In the restaurant, all staff are very nice and they are all Korean, but they also speak English. If you want to try Korean food, I highly recommend the restaurant.

Jangmojip is located in downtown, at 1719 Robson St. The word jangmojip means a house of a man's mother-in-law. As the wife's mother is usually very nice to her son-in-law, they chose the name to show that they take good care of customers just like a man's mother-in-law takes care of her son-in-law. They have a lot of kinds of Korean traditional soups, some Korean barbecue, and some fried rice. I recommend you to have kalbitang which is a beef-rib soup. It is a soup with beef and it is boiled with cow's bones. It is very nice and not spicy, and I am sure you will like it. You can also try some Korean traditional alcohol drinks which taste similar to vodka. You should try them even if you are not an alcoholic. I think you should drink them with some soup because we believe that it is better than if you just drink it as it is. You can also try some other food and you will know what it is by looking at the menu because it is both in Korean and in English.

I went to both restaurants and had great food. I hope you go there and try it yourselves. I am sure you will find it a nice experience. Although the menus of these two restaurants are similar, they are differences in tastes. I hope you will have a great time.



learning from Ernest Hemingway's The Old Man and The Sea

xpressing your thoughts and putting them into words, in other words writing, is a hard job to do. There have been many great authors in the previous century. Ernest Hemingway is one of them. He lived an interesting life, but his unique writing style is even more interesting. Its simplicity and clearness brought him a Nobel Prize for literature in 1954.

Being a student who wants to learn how to write a wellorganized piece of writing, I have read many books written in English. When I read Ernest Hemingway's books, I found them simple and understandable, even though English is my second language. The way he is describing things is unbelievable. Just looking at the sentences makes me think I am in the middle of the scene.

Hemingway always wanted to be a writer. He was a good writer when he was in high school. Even though he did not get good grades, he was good at describing things. When his father wanted him to study at a university, he decided to join the army and later, become a writer. Later he became a reporter, and he found Red Cross ad in the newspaper for an ambulance driver. He volunteered to be able to go to war, which he finally did.

Hemingway's life was full of adventures. He was a sportsman, and he loved hunting, bullfighting, and fishing. From my point of view, his experiences made him a great writer. Even though he was a natural writer, I believe his experiences helped him to get inspiration for his writing. Also, he wrote some of his best works based on his experiences and his feelings at that time.

In my opinion, the best book he ever wrote is 'The Old man and The Sea'. This novel is a story about an old fisherman and what he was going through while he was catching a big fish. Hemingway wrote this novel when he was spending his time in Cuba. It reveals life philosophy. In the novel, the old man struggles to get the big fish; however, he loses it by sharks. The sharks represent the death, but by facing them and giving his best, life triumphs over death.

After I read the novel, I realized that I have to do my best to get through hard times. Winning or losing is not so important to if you give your best and try your hardest.
